Nordlux: 'Christianization'

I don't support Christianization, but they decided to adopt Christianity because of political reasons. They were pressed by the two sides, by the Byzantine Empire and from the other side, from the Frankish Empire. Basically, Bulgarians bordered the Frankish Empire in the modern-day Hungary.

So, yeah, it was quite a big empire back in the time. In the modern-day Hungary, I believe Budapest was in Bulgarian hands at that time, so you can see where the borders were. So, the Pope was pushing the Franks against the Bulgarians and the Byzantines were pushing from the other side.

And they decided to adopt Christianity, which of course was not very... Most of the military class, the Bulgarians, were still pagans and they didn't want to adopt the enemy's religion. And this caused riots and unrest and in the longer term, it caused the fall of the empire, actually, 100 years later. So, they decided to adopt Christianity, but they adopted Christianity without the Latin alphabet and without the Greek alphabet, based on the alphabet that came from, partially at least, from the Bulgarian runes, from the old Scythian runes that were used.

And of course, some of the alphabet, some of the letters came from the Greek, but most of the letters didn't come from the Greek because the Greeks had 24 letters, the original Bulgarian alphabet had 44 or 45 letters. So, from where these 21 or 20 or 21 letters came? And obviously, some of them came from old runic letters that were used before the Christianization. Like 100, 150, 200 years before the Christianization.

So, these things are totally overlooked by the historians. They claim different, different other stories. But anyway... So, this language is basically like a traditional language that's been somewhat modified.

Yes, it was basically... What is the term that historians used? It was lingua franca. So, basically, lingua franca means... Universal language. Universal language for Eastern Europe, especially for the Balkans.

And that's why until the term Slav maybe originated based on that, because when these people started to read the scripture, they adopted the language. Maybe their language was similar. Maybe it was similar, because otherwise they won't accept this language.

But in some cases, maybe it was different, because in the case of the Romanians, they used the Romanian variant of the Cyrillic alphabet until 860, I believe. And then they adopted the Latin alphabet. And partially because they wanted to limit the influence of the Russians, and, of course, to limit the influence of the Bulgarians.

At some point, we were liberated by the Turkish yoke, which happened something like

17, 18 years later. And that's why they adopted this. And, of course, there was a lot of Bulgarian words in the modern Romanian.

The capital of... A lot of things. There were a lot of Bulgarian speakers back in the time in present-day Romania. And then Vlachians, of course, they were under Bulgarian rule for quite a long period of time.

We're talking about populations that are genetically close together in the Balkans? Yeah, there's always schisms internally between the slightly different groups. Yeah. There's different biological qualities.

We're talking about cultural influences, not so much different genetic influences, of course. That's like six tribes in Scotland. Yeah, yeah.

On a larger scale. Yeah. That's why I don't agree with the term Slavs, for many reasons, actually.

Because it's an imperial term that the Russians pushed during the Russian Empire. This pan-Slavism, it's the pan-Slavism behind the pan-Slavism. There was a philosopher around, I think it was someone somewhere in the 1800s, late 1800s, who was pushing that pan-Slavism.

I think it was a guy named Soloviev or something. Yeah, yeah, yeah. Take into mind that the term Slav, like a tribal term, was invented in, I believe, in the 16th century by a Croatian monk.

Because the Croatians were pressed very, very hard by the Ottomans from one side and from the Germans from the other. And they wanted to find, how to say, identity. So they've read these old sources.

And I suppose he didn't understand the sources. Some of the sources were Bulgarian, of course, some of the sources were local. And he didn't understand that the word Slovene didn't mean tribal terms.

Slovo means world. And most likely it referred to the world of God, right? So basically they referred to the Christians. They've always got to import their Christian angle on everything.

Always distort everything that is traditional for the Aryan. Yeah, yeah, yeah. If they don't outright destroy it altogether, like the Library of Alexandria or whatever other ancient artifacts they've destroyed.

Take into mind that, for example, when on one occasion the Byzantium troops managed to enter the pagan capital Pliska. I always laughed when I heard the Christians. They said, oh, the pagans were some kind of uncivilized barbarians, something like that.

Pliska was built in a very interesting... Some people suggest Persian influences because of the Iranian origin of the Bulgarians, most likely. The people, the pagan Pliska had paths. They had marble columns.

They wrote on the marble columns with Greek letters. That's why we have the title of the ruler, which is not Kan, but Kanas Juvigi. Which, as I said before, it is the root of the so-called Slavic title called Knyaz.

So Kanas, Knyaz, you can see. And it means basically ruler by the gods. And Juvigi means Jupiter.

I believe the Romans had similar, Jovi. So basically the ruler by the will of Jupiter, the sky god, the thunder god. Jupiter Optimus Maximus.

So they managed to enter the capital. They destroyed everything. They described how they smashed the heads of the kids.

Typical Jewish behavior, by the way. And it was quite interesting because the Byzantium source basically quoted text passages from the Bible. Where Yahweh is smashing the evil pagans or something like that.

And they're recreating this thing, the Byzantium. And they even took very strong soldiers with iron hammers and they started to smash the marble columns. And the marble columns were very interesting because there were pairs, I believe 300 pairs.

It was something quite called the way of memory or something. Because the columns from one side were written in Romans, all Bulgarian Romans, and the other were written in Greek. And the reason of that was the Bulgarians found that the Greeks very often forget what the contracts were.

The contract between the Bulgarians. It's a matter of convenience for themselves. Yeah.

And they always forgot. That's why they read on the other side what is written in Greek. And when they capture some prisoner of war or they have a delegation or something.

And they're showing what is written, for example, 5 or 10 or 20 years ago. Why they're, for example, they're fighting the battle or something like that. So, it was kind of quite interesting the way of reminding the Romans that they're scumbags and they don't keep their promise, basically.

It must have been because of the admixture that the Romans had undergone through the Near Eastern infiltration with all the traitors. All the interbreeding that must have taken them down to a lower level of morality. Take in mind that when I say Romans, especially in the Eastern Roman Empire, it was very interesting hodgepodge.

Because most of the Greeks, if you ask the Greeks, they would say it was the Greek

Empire, but it was not like that. Greek, basically at the start, the official language of the empire was Latin, of course. But the language of the merchants and the people was Greek

So, the Greek started to become much more influenced and some parts started to replace Latin like official language. But at the same time, there are a lot of different other groups of people that spoke different languages. One of the groups are basically Bulgarians, or if you want to say Slavs, so basically Slovenians, that were Christians.

They were Christianized and they didn't like the regime of the pagans. So, at some point, Bulgarians were quite liberal, let's put it that way, towards the Christians. But they soon realized that the Christians were not reliable.

So, how is that now at this time in history with the Christianization? Obviously, most of Eastern Europe is probably heavily Christian, right? I don't think so. I mean, on the very superficial level, it looks like it's Christian. But maybe it's true for the Greeks, maybe it's true for the Russians.

About the Bulgarians, no. All these traditions, they're all pagan. And they're not only pagan, the Christian Church never managed to integrate these traditions very well.

I don't know how to describe it, but it's because of the different, how to say, different way of operating. The Catholic Church, they always claim domination of the Pope over the kings. So, basically papal caesarism, right? The spiritual power is above the worldly power.

Here, the Orthodox, they were on the second power. They said that Caesar must rule the empire. It's a quote of Rabbi Yeshu, right? I could quote it in Bulgarian, but I don't know what is the English translation.

But basically, they said that the tsar must rule the empire and the spiritual power, so basically the patriots, must obey him. So, in that case, they didn't enforce the Christianization. In reality, it was just Christianization of the nobility of the tsar, of course, around the court.

And the nobility in the different provinces, like in Ukraine, western Ukraine was Bulgarian basically, until maybe the Hungarian invasion. Maybe at that point, by the way, the Bulgarians were pagans at that point there, and they maybe joined the Hungarians. So, yeah, it's a complicated story.

The Balkans are quite complicated, but the people followed very heavily pagan traditions until the present day. So, there's been sort of a destruction of paganism because of the Soviet regime, you mean? More likely, it's a weird, my theory, of course, but I'll... The show is quite long, so maybe it's... Yeah, but give us a teaser about the current situation of the sort of Aryan consciousness or the rekindling of that consciousness. Let's finish.

So, basically, paganism. Paganism, I'll give an example with the traditions. A very pagan tradition is Scythians and Bulgarians, they had the habit of taking the chop of the heads of their enemies and collect them.

So, basically, they're headhunters like the Celts and maybe the Teutons, because the Teutons, the Norse people at least, they had these chairs, basically, a skol, which means skull. So, they had this tradition of drinking from the skulls of their defeated enemies. And there is a esoteric thing behind that too, because by drinking from the skull, you receive the power of your defeated enemy.

And anyway, so, it's a very known story that at least one Roman emperor was beheaded by a Bulgarian ruler and his head was used by a Krum. The head of the Roman was used by Krum for drinking. And the guy's name was Krum? Yeah.

So, like Conan the Barbarian. Yeah, yeah, yeah. Krum is another way of saying, basically, Tangrum, which is this hero, the sky deity that defeated Jahe.

And Krum is Grom, and Grom means thunder. So, it's a sky deity. It's always been that.

Even, you know, the diamond thunderbolt thought, it's always been thunder and the god of the sky. And think about the world that is very popular and one of the most popular Bulgarian words that is in circulation. Pogrom.

Pogrom? Okay, yes. That's a good way of getting revenge on the Jews. Yeah.

By God, by Krum. Yeah. So, this is, the origin is the god Krum, or Grom, the thunder god.

So, anyway. So, one of the Bohemian crusaders. So, he could be German, he could be Czech, right? Crusaders were passing through Bulgaria and through the so-called Holy Land.

And he fell in love with a Bulgarian noble lady. And he sat on the table. Of course, they're seemingly Christian.

They're from highborn. So, they're close to the court, to the tsar. And he fell in love.

He was some knight, maybe from high ranking from Bohemia, who knows, maybe a German nobility. And he fell in love. And he was terrified because... And this is something like, I believe, 300 years after the supposed Christianization of Bulgaria.

They... He sat on the table and he was terrified because Bulgarians basically took from some plate, they took skull caps. Basically, caps created from skulls. And one of the Bulgarians, one of the younger warriors was very, very proud because he said that he chopped off the head of some Mongol or something.

And he used the cap for drinking. And this is very pagan tradition. I mean, it was popular

around all Europe.

You must read about the Celts and their headhunters ability. Especially... What was this Celtic tribe? That were very problematic for the Romans. Is that the one with Burson, Getterix? No, no, no, no, no.

We're talking about the Scottish Picts. The Picts were very, very strong in the headhunting. I mean, they managed to destroy one whole legion or something.

And when the Romans found them, or at least half of the legion. When the Romans found them, basically the whole cohort was decapitated. So they took the heads for the trophies.

So very, very esoteric, Aryan way of dealing with the enemies. And how to say, to take their power, let's say. Most of the people that listen won't be very happy to hear that.

It's pleasant to talk with intelligent people. It's quite rare. Yeah, well it's pretty hard to find people who are on our side in this whole world.

Obviously it's up to us to make other people on our side. To try to influence them to come on to our side. But yeah, definitely people listening to this right now should check into relocating to Bulgaria.

If it's within the cards for you. If you want to do that instead of... If you have no other choices, no better options. Yeah, maybe if you have some money on the side.

It will be much easier to settle yourself in Bulgaria than in for example Sweden or Norway. Because I had... It's a long story but there are some people that tried to establish communities there. But it's a very expensive country.

And of course very... How to say... People are quite brainwashed in the majority. Yeah, it's the same in Canada. Only up there they at least have some identity.

But here they have almost no identity at all. It's just consumerism. So maybe we can talk in the future about this thing.

Whenever you want, just let me know. Yeah, yeah. I'm interested in further investigating Bulgaria as a possible relocation place for myself.

Because I really don't see much hope of trying to set up anything in Canada. It just seems like a dead end. There's really not much going on.

Let's put it that way. It will be much easier... At least I found talking with these scumbags, the voyeurs. That it's much easier for people from the first world.

Let's put it that way. Americans and Canadians. And all kinds of people that are out of European Union.

But Bulgaria had mutual agreements or contracts with them. It is much easier to obtain a

double citizenship. But there are different judicial gaps.

So we must exploit them. We will have more experience after some period of time. I can share my experience with the people that are interested.

As long as you don't jeopardize your situation by all means. Tell us whatever you think we need to know. I never hide myself.

A lot of people in Bulgaria know me. I'm reachable. Maybe reachable.

If a guy from the comment section of Bitchwood could meet me. He's kind of reachable. It's not a thing that I'm hiding.

Maybe the reason for that is that in Bulgaria. The fucking communists. They are not friendly to the nationalists obviously.

But they are too busy to deal with other stuff. They are too busy to suck money from the European Union. And to deal with their own corruption.

And now they have problems with the... So they are drowning in their own sewage. Basically we are going in a political crisis right now. They are too busy for now at least.

But maybe in the future. Maybe in the future. To say something like opposite thoughts against the settlement in Bulgaria.

Because we are a European Union country. Maybe in the future the European Union faggots will force more harsh measures against nationalists. Who knows? But until that time we are kind of free to operate.

At least in certain conditions. I mean I don't want to establish some kind of open political party. Because this is counterproductive.

So let's look at this more perhaps social things. Like establishing communities for example. Yeah that is what I am thinking is the only alternative.

You are not going to get anywhere through any political process. Exactly. Throw your money into that.

You may as well just gamble away or whatever else. Exactly. You can make for your future for anyone listening who has any money.

Is obviously to invest in your own race. In terms of infrastructure like farmland and things like that. And actual people that you can build a community with and become a part of.

And even be the leader of if you are the one with all the money. If not the leader then at least a privilege. Let's put it that way.

And I will stop with that. I will finish the conversation. In Bulgaria there is something like I believe from 5 to 10,000 British citizens.

Now they are mostly elderly people. But from middle age to older people. Let's put it that way.

They are quite easily integrated in Bulgarian society. But also they are building their own societies. They are inhabiting exactly these villages that we are talking about.

And they are rebuilding the villages. And interestingly enough the Brits don't have problems like Bulgarians. And some other groups that we don't like.

Gypsies and so on. The Brits maybe because of their imperial experience in India or something. They don't mind to settle next to the gypsy ghetto or something.

Which is kind of weird for me. I suppose that they have some problems because of that. But they don't mind in most of the cases.

They will serve as a buffer then. But they are building communities. And I think if these people that are not racialist most of them I believe.

Building communities. Why not the racialists come here and build communities? I mean it won't be great. I mean there are a lot of problems here.

But it will be much better than to wait your turn in a slaughterhouse like in America for example. Yeah, well basically it's no great cakewalk in these countries. Because you have to grind all day and night.
