Complaint of Mr. J.C. MacCorkindale

1. Mr. J.C. MacCorkindale has written to the Officer Commanding "O" Division requesting to be advised if we have any record of him on our files as being connected with the National Unity Party. ✓

2. Apparently, Mr. MacCorkindale was referred to in the Magazine Digest in an article entitled "The Trojan Horse in Canada" as an active organizer and associate of the National Unity Party. ✓

3. The only reference we have on our files to this gentleman is a report submitted by "O" Division dated July 9, 1938, indicating that his name had been suggested as a leader of the National Unity Party in Toronto. At the same time the names of Colonel Pasey and Colonel Drew were mentioned. There is no indication that he was ever a member of the Party. ✓

4. Is it desirable that this Force should give him a clean bill of health in this connection?

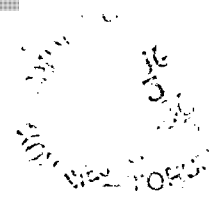



Maybe am I the only man who will write to you with regard to this matter. You can be sure that Tim Buck, who has been set free by you, has not lost his time. Everything is ready and there is plenty of ammunition and glycerine in Jewish dwellings.

You know that on Sunday there were two explosions on Rachel Street: it is a beginning. They were afraid of the National Unity, but they are not afraid of the Federal Government. They have found the means of getting rid of them, but I will not do like them, and it is the reason why I made inquiries.

I cannot speak, because the people who speak are being sent to a concentration camp. We, Canadians, have no right to defend ourselves. You are a Canadian; so why did you not protect your fellow-countrymen, instead of protecting Jews? The National Unity is essentially a Canadian organization; you should have become a member of such an organization! instead of making trouble.

You said over the radio: "Our Canada that we love so much!", but you are working against Canada. Those who are dangerous, are the Jews, and Stalin is terrible. I tell you: those men are innocent (the members of the N.U.P.) and everybody knows it. Avoid troubles.

The Jewish leaders have ordered their agents in Europe to send letters, telling them what to say in those letters. Those letters were written by Jews living in Europe and these Jews are proud of their trick. I would prefer talking to somebody about this matter, but I cannot, because you would send me to a concentration camp.

You should do something with regard to this matter as Attorney-General. You could set them free secretly (the members of the N.U.P.) and afterwards make common cause with them. They alone defend our cause. In the Police Department there are Jewish emigrants who came from Russia and a large number of Jews are Constables: these people will help the others. You know that dynamite was put on the rails on Rachel Street; there were two explosions. It is a beginning, but you do not seem to pay attention to it.

Communists have written to Hepburn, advising that the Nazis would come over here: it is a lie, because they (the Communists) will begin the massacre in Canada and blame the Nazis for that. Open your eyes before it is too late, otherwise blood is going to be shed in the streets.

BARCK, Joseph FARR, Henry LORIMER, Léo BRUNET, Paul GIGUERE and Marius GATIEN, appeared for Preliminary Hearing before Judge Desserres on June 19th.

2. Senior Crown Prosecutor Gerald Fauteux, K.C., appeared for the prosecution. The accused were defended by Sallustre Lavery, K.C. and John M. Cotton, K.C.

3. The writer was the only witness called and examination in chief continued until late in the afternoon when Judge Desserres halted the hearing and suggested that several of the exhibits filed in court should be shown to the Provincial Attorney General. The case was postponed until June 21st.

4. On the morning of June 20th, Senior Crown Prosecutor Fauteux left for Quebec City where the exhibits filed in this case were shown to the Provincial Attorney General. As a result of instructions then received, I proceeded to Ottawa on June 21st, where these exhibits were shown to Mr. Anderson of the Department of Justice.


5. As you are aware an internment order for all of the above persons was issued on the afternoon of June 21st. The accused were accordingly transferred to the internment camp where they are now held.



Our friends from abroad will of a surety avail themselves with pleasure of this kind invitation.

The conference takes place in Central Germany. The place the day and all further details regarding the meeting will be forwarded in sufficient time to all participants who have definitely decided to come.

Owing to the generosity of different friends from abroad, we are this time able to offer completely free board and lodging, for the duration of the Conference, to every one of the delegated taking part in it.

Foreigners who stay for a period of eight days in Germany and who, in accordance with the regulations, give notice of their intention to do so on entering the country, enjoy reductions in railway fares on the German State Railways amounting to between 25 and 60%, according to their country of origin. In accordance with this arrangement it is possible to enter Germany by one frontier station and to leave by another. A break in the journey at three different stations is permitted. Further details are obtainable from the travel-agencies.

Such further advantages as we may be able to obtain for one or another of our delegates, remain as yet undecided.

Foreigners, upon the presentation of their tickets and passports at the travel agency of their place of residence, can obtain the so-called Travel Marks (i.e. Register Marks, in form of Travellers Cheques) for their requirements during their stay in Germany. These can be purchased at a price 15% below that of the ordinary Inland Marks.

Delegates who desire to take part in our consultations on strictly confidential terms only, or under a "nom de plume", receive in this connection every possible guarantee. The names of participants in the Conference will under no circumstances be made public.....

Foreigners, upon the presentation of their tickets and passports at the travel agency of their place of residence, can obtain the so-called Travel Marks (i.e. Register Marks, in form of Travellers Cheques) for their requirements during their stay in Germany. These can be purchased at a price 15% below that of the ordinary Inland Marks.

Delegates who desire to take part in our consultations on strictly confidential terms only, or under a "nom de plume", receive in this connection every possible guarantee. The names of participants in the Conference will under no circumstances be made public.....



Investigation of Fascists Spreads To Maritimes

WITH Quebec Provincial Police instructed by Premier Godbout to co-operate fully with Royal Canadian Mounted Police in running down Fifth Columnists in the Province of Quebec the drive against Canada's internal enemies gained speed this week-end.

Slashing at would-be Fascists, Nazis and Communists Premier Godbout declared to The Standard this afternoon: "There is no doubt that we are in grave danger from wilful as well as unconscious supporters of the enemies of Great Britain and France. Persons who belong to movements inimical to our form of government should take stock of their position today."

The Premier declared that Quebec's key industrial and power plants must be protected at all costs against possible sabotage.

In the meantime intelligence officers of the R.C.M.P. carefully checked over material seized in raids on 16 leaders in Adrien Arcand's Fascist-like National Unity Party and hinted that arrests would likely follow. A full report on the nature of the seized material is going to Ottawa with a request for instructions on future action.

Active investigation in the National Unity Party is also swinging out from Montreal to the Maritimes and Ontario, where it was learned organization drives had been made.

It is known that Jew-baiting William J. Crane, 40-year-old unemployed tailor, of 21 Livingstone avenue, Halifax, had been acting as Maritime organizer for the National Unity Party.

Known to Halifax police as "a great talker against the Jews" Crane enjoyed public prominence when he was kicked off Halifax relief roles because he refused to work.

Assisting Crane in spreading the word of the Canadian Fuehrer along the east coast, the Montreal investigation showed, were a man named McDuff, known as the Maritime leader of the party, and Dan O'Keefe of Campbellton, N.B.

All three men are known to have been in communication with leaders of the party and had received instruction on recruiting. The fact that official National Unity Party receipts, impressive looking papers the size of currency and bearing the picture of Adrien Arcand and ranging in value from .25 cents to \$10 had been offered for sale in Halifax is being checked. The receipts were reportedly offered for sale as investments in Canadian Unity.

Anti-Jewish Drive

The main plank of the National Unity party as with its European counterparts has always been anti-Semitism. A flood of anti-Jewish literature signed only by "The Defenders" which swept Halifax about the time that Crane was most active in organizing his Maritime branches of the National Unity Party is now under police scrutiny.

The trail from Montreal also is leading police to various branches of the party in Ontario.

Arcand's Party Says Openly It Would End Democracy

Adrien Arcand's National Unity Party of Canada, which has come under R.C.M.P. anti-fifth column action in Montreal, models itself on the German National Socialist Party, the Italian Fascist Party and Sir Oswald Mosley's British Union of Fascists. That is shown by its publications, by the speeches of its leader and by its organization.

Like these movements abroad the National Unity Party says openly that it wants to destroy democracy and replace it with authoritarian rule. The ruling power would of course be Arcand's party. Throughout its publications and the statements of its leader the anti-democratic pro-totalitarian tune is played insistently.

The Arcand organization, like the similar movements abroad not only makes totalitarian propaganda. It also organizes its own forces to be ready for action "in time of need."

There are over 20 companies of Legionaries, the storm troops of the Arcand party, in Montreal. In St. Henry alone there are eight companies. There are others in Cote St. Paul and Verdun. Other companies drill in the Maisonneuve-Rosemount area and in many other parts of the city, especially in the North End.

The Legionaries of Blue Shirts, as they also like to call themselves, have a military type of organization. They are divided into companies, usually containing 50 odd men each. At the head of each company is a Sergeant-Major. Under him come an Orderly Sergeant, Sergeants, Corporals and Lance-Corporals and the ordinary Legionaries.

Head of the Legionaries is Maurice Scott, who reports to the Leader, Adrien Arcand. Under him are "inspectors" and "monitors."

Transportation

Officers of the Blue Shirts in recent weeks have been emphasizing to their men the necessity of being able to move quickly and to "strike when needed." They have asked all Legionaries to report any motor cars, trucks, motor cycles they own so that they may be available to the Party when needed.

Arcand formerly called his organization the National Socialist Christian Party. Under that name extensive propaganda was done in Quebec province and a corps of Blue Shirts was raised. All this was done under the sign of the swastika. Arcand meetings were conducted just as were Nazi meetings in Germany, with great swastika banners over the platform.

The party carried on active propaganda directed toward turning Canada into an authoritarian state like Germany or Italy. Pamphlets, books, publications of all kinds poured out from its headquarters and branches, all aimed in one direction.

Hitler and Mussolini

Some of the actual material sent out by the party is known to have come from Germany. Some of the writings produced here bore a close resemblance to material put out by Nazi propaganda bodies in the Reich.

Among members admiration of Hitler and Mussolini was deep and often expressed.

Anti-Semitism played a prominent part in the propaganda of the movement, just as it did with the Nazis, with Mosley's Blackshirts and in recent years with the Italian Fascists.

The Arcand organization became Dominion-wide two years ago when other groups in various parts of the country became affiliated at a meeting held in Toronto. The name was then changed to National Unity Party of Canada.

Propaganda of a Nazi type for the movement was pushed after that in provinces outside Quebec. In Ontario Joseph Farr, of Toronto, was the leader. In the Maritimes William Crane of Halifax was organizer and distributor of propaganda. In New Brunswick the moving spirit was Dan O'Keefe of Campbellton.

Officially the party dropped the swastika as an emblem using instead a flaming torch.

Given a Warning

At the outbreak of war the authorities gave Arcand a warning. For a time after that he lay comparatively low. He left his position on a Montreal French-language newspaper and was reported to be living in the Laurentians. Activities of the National Unity Party dropped to a low ebb.

But in the last few months the party in Montreal has shown signs of having received a shot in the arm. The word had gone out that there was to be no public propaganda or activities. But meetings were held in private houses.

A new campaign was begun to bring back old Legionnaires into "active service" and to enlist new ones. A drive was made for subscription.

In the last few weeks a number of meetings of officers of the Blue Shirts have been held in Montreal. The new situation of the party under war conditions was discussed. Leaders repeatedly told Legionnaires that their opportunity was coming near.

Strenuous efforts were made to organize transport facilities for the Blue Shirts.

On War Work

Among the men who have been attending meetings are some with jobs connected with war activities. At least one is working in a local airplane factory that is making planes for the Government.

In conversation members are known to have often expressed the hope that Hitler would triumph over Great Britain and France. It was a prevailing opinion among them that the time for their movement would come in Canada after the war—with the defeat of the Allies.

Meetings have been held secretly, usually in members' houses. The place is not announced but members are advised a few hours ahead of time. Propaganda leaflets have been sent round regularly to members houses in secret.

One of the secret meetings was going on in the house of an officer on Thursday night when the R.C.M.P. made a series of raids of houses of leaders and officers of the party. The raiding party seized literature but did not arrest any of those present, contenting with taking their names and addresses.

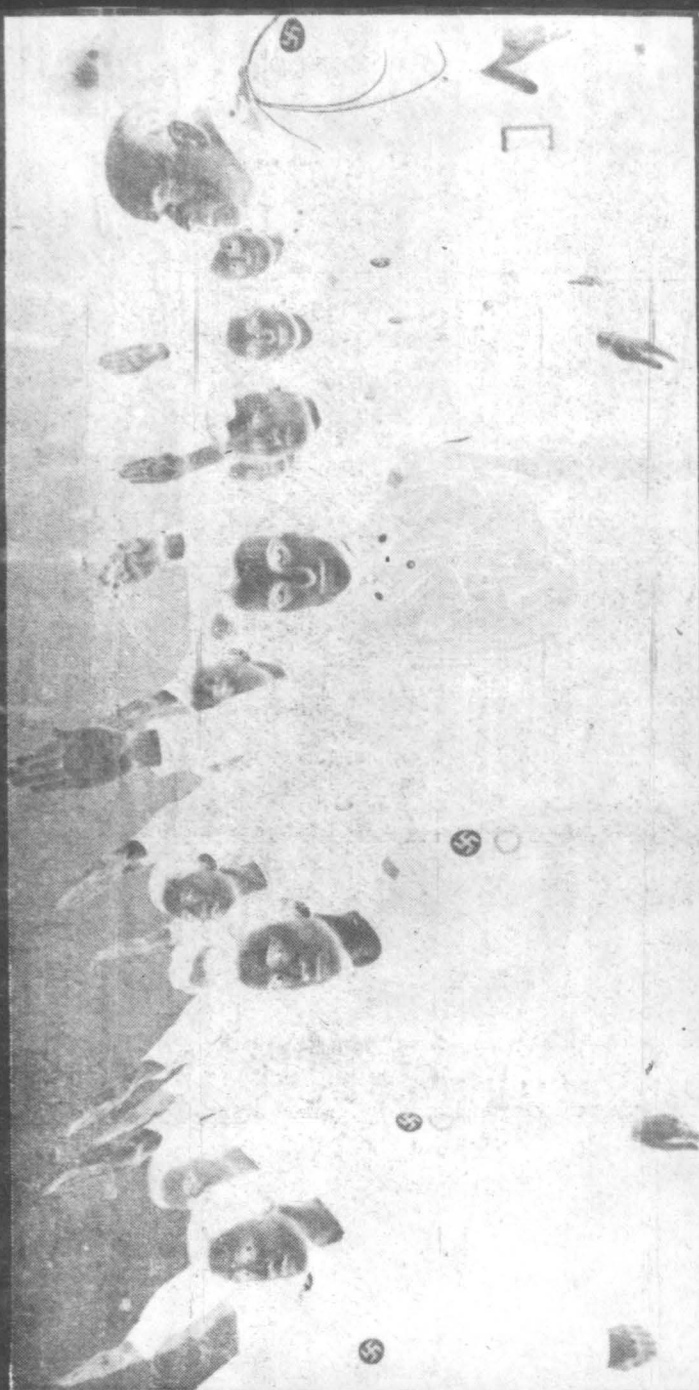

No Activity Reported From Party in Toronto

TORONTO, May 25 — With Fifth Column activities the talk of the hour, many Torontonians are wondering what has happened to the National Unity underground group and their erstwhile leader Joseph C. Farr. Whether members in this city are still active, in view of the threat to the Empire from their prototypes in Germany, remains known only to members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, who have been keeping a day to day watch on their activities for some three years, and R.C.M.P. officers maintain strict silence.

Farr was the centre of a great deal of publicity in the Toronto press over two years ago, but of late the ordinary citizen never hears anything about him.

At one point in the party organization, the party leader had his headquarters in a well-known Toronto hotel until he was required to leave when the management objected to the number of visitors who came to his quarters each day. Some time later headquarters were established in a downtown building, where members were reported to be going through some sort of military drill.

CLOSED UP

The drilling aspect was denied at the time, but so much public resentment was aroused, the new headquarters was closed up.

At that time, Farr claimed that the organization had a "cell" in every ward in the city, and boasted that the membership totalled seven hundred young men in the beaches district, all of whom carried membership cards. Evidences of this were supported by several incidents on Toronto's eastern beaches, when Jews were insulted and chased from the sands, and anti-Jewish signs were painted in the district.

Farr is alleged to have tried unsuccessfully to join the Canadian Corps and to have lost his connection with a Toronto beverage firm when he was caught endeavoring to organize the employes as part of his scheme to build up his party.

NATIONAL UNITY PARTY

Confidential information received indicates that Joe FARR, former national organizer of the National Unity Party who was reported to have been ousted from his position in the Party is again active on behalf of that organization. He lives in Toronto at 449 Jarvis Street and has been in communication with John Trayling, member of the said party, regarding printing undertaken by him and which evidently is to be sent to Montreal. More than likely this printing is being done on behalf of the N.U.P. (pamphlets, etc.)

2. FARR has also communicated with Mr. Wellings, manufacturing jeweler of Toronto, in connection with the manufacture of Party buttons, described as small bronze buttons with a small flame in the centre. Only fifty of these buttons were available and Wellings has apparently undertaken to manufacture a large number of them which are apparently required in Montreal. The indication is that the activities of this organization are on the increase and it is expected that large numbers of new members will be forthcoming. At the present time we have information of organizing activity within the Party itself and no doubt when this organization is completed their activities will come into public prominence.

3. It is reported that FARR many times referred to the 'Chief' and it was presumed that the Chief was Adrien Arcand. However, in one instance he referred to the Chief and Arcand and it is possible that the Chief referred to may be a local officer of the National Unity Party. The frequent references to the Chief by FARR and his conversations with him suggest that he resides in Toronto. We have no information that Arcand has recently left Montreal and, in fact, we know that for some time he has been confined to his home as a result of injuries sustained in an accident whilst skiing.

4. Reference is made to a man named Ray Manville who is apparently a Jew from Saskatchewan and is reported to be known to members of this Force in the Prince Albert District. Manville is said to have expressed anti-Jewish sentiments. This is difficult to understand in view of the fact that he is Jewish himself. It is reported that he is active in Saskatchewan on behalf of the N.U.P. and he is said to be promoting anti-Jewish sentiments in that district. Possibly inquiries should be made in Saskatchewan to ascertain if the Manville known to members of the Prince Albert Sub-Division is in any way connected with the National Unity Party and if he has recently made a trip to the East. It is possible, of course, that the person referred to by Farr is not the man from Saskatchewan.

5. The confidential information indicates that in common with other members of the National Unity Party, FARR endeavoured to converse authoritatively on international matters as though the National Unity Party was a factor in matters of this kind.

1. Copy of a report in the above connection, submitted by "E" Division is forwarded for your information.
2. It will be noted that O'Keefe is at present active in connection with a re-organization of this movement in British Columbia, and it is expected that he will be there for some time. If and when he returns to the Maritime Provinces he should be kept under observation as it is felt that this young man will endeavour to further the aims of the Party in the Eastern Provinces when he returns from the west coast.
3. For your information, there are indications that this Party is conducting a reorganization, which activity is now confined to officers and trusted members although it is expected that in the future endeavours will again be made to recruit followers from the general public.
4. Until receipt of the report from Vancouver indicating activity in that section, reorganization was confined to Montreal, headquarters of Arcand, the leader of this movement, and it is more than likely that from now on we shall receive indications of the ramifications of this organization from the different provinces.
5. You are, therefore, requested to keep this matter in mind with a view to obtaining any information which would suggest that similar reorganization is being carried on in New Brunswick.

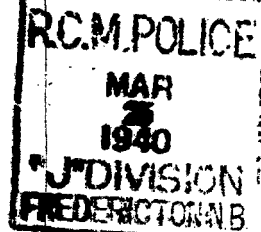

1. Further to report of 7th/Inst, para.1.(3), the following report received from [REDACTED] re the above:-

(1) Donald OKEEFFE (quoted in last report as Daniel OKEEFFE) arrived from Winnipeg in Vancouver on A.M. 12th Inst. and immediately contacted J.U. MONTALBAN, N.U.P. Prov. Organizer for B.C.

(2) OKEEFFE was born in New Brunswick, of mixed Irish, Scotch and English blood. He is 24 years of age, dark skin and hair, pale brown eyes, about 5'-9" in height, some 165 lbs in weight, very good looking, well educated, intelligent and smart talker, dresses well, with flare for colours, but wears no tie. Went through College and finished with Post Graduate Course in an American University in Sociology. OKEEFFE is the N.U.P. Organizer for the Maritime Provinces and is also a member of the National Supreme Council.

(3) [REDACTED] the following data regarding the N.U.P. and its recent resurrection:- FARR is no longer active in the Party. ARCANO is not writing in the paper any more. DECARIE is still Financial Director of the Party. There is no change in the set-up of the Party except that the members of German birth are to be left alone (out) for the present. Otherwise the activities of the Party are to slowly increased, but always under cover. The National Supreme Council has changed its members. Who they are is not said. Money is somewhat scarce to date, OKEEFFE having to pay his own expenses on this trip and apparently being quite hard up.

(4) [REDACTED] The Party is now allied with MOSLEY in England and they claim to have a very good "Intelligence Service" by which they know:-

(a) That South Africa is lost to the Empire.

(b) That India is also lost, but same is unimportant.

(c) That this month a German bombing of Paris will take place, that the Germans will break through the Maginot Line in three (3) places which are now deeply mined, and at the same time the Germans will break into France through Switzerland.

(d) That the new Governor General of Canada will be Lord ATHERLONE (Brother of the present Queen), that this appointment is already decided but will not be announced until after he is in Canada because of the possibility of the Canadian Premier being against it, Lord ATHERLONE being a Fascist.

(e) That the present Government of England, whose policies have been in the hands of Jews for the past ten (10) years, is doomed, that the country will be turned over to the Fascist Party in England and for that reason Canada will be governed by ARCANO.

(5) While here from A.M. 12th to P.M. 13th. Insts. OKEEFFE was practically all the time in the company of MONTALBAN. "Outsiders" interviewed during that time were George WRIGHT of the News Herald and Graham DARLING, U.B.C. student and son of the lawyer Clarence DARLING. Regarding OKEEFFE'S overtures for WRIGHT'S paper to represent the Party at this end, WRIGHT did not seem very interested, advising OKEEFFE to keep undercover till the war was finished. OKEEFFE asked DARLING to sponsor the movement with students of the U.B.C. In this move, however, OKEEFFE met with no success, DARLING being too level headed to get mixed up in such matters, particularly during war time.

(6) On evening of 12th Inst. OKEEFFE attended a Liberal Meeting at Hastings Auditorium and severely heckled the Hon. Ian MACKENZIE.

(7) OKEEFFE instructed MONTALBAN to work quietly undercover to revive the Party in B.C. and endeavour to get as many sound anglo-Saxons at the head of affairs, as they intend to do throughout Canada. OKEEFFE was found to be of dynamic personality, very clever, good speaker, sincere and very likable, well read, good musician, very Anti-Jewish and definitely efficient in leadership among young people. He left on evening of 13th Inst. for Winnipeg, enroute to the Maritimes. The main N.U.P. centres of this revived Party are Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver. Once properly established at said points, branches will then be formed throughout all provinces.

2. I received information yesterday [redacted] confirming the fact that OKEEFFE was here on dates stated above and that he was continually in the company of MONTALBAN, the reason for the visit being the resurrection of the N.U.P. under cover. AS [redacted] this way we will have a double check as the movement develops.

3. OKEEFFE'S confidences to MONTALBAN, as set out in Para.1.(4) herein, are certainly interesting, OKEEFFE'S summing up of the situation being that the N.U.P. is out to save the British Empire, that the British policies of the past ten years have been anti-British but Pro-Jewish and that the Empire will now be smashed unless patriots like the N.U.P. can save the day, etc. The slimy growth of this movement will be carefully covered at this end.



Fascist Activities in Canada

Information has been obtained

in the past that Daniel O'Keefe of Campbellton, New Brunswick is an active Fascist organizer in Canada. According to O'Keefe, there are approximately 350,000 persons residing in New Brunswick, Canada, of which approximately 15,000 are members of the Fascist organization which he represents. The active head of this organization in Toronto, Canada, is said to be Maris Gatiou, the Minister of Public Instruction for Toronto. The allegation is made that practically all of the members of the Toronto Police Department are affiliated in one way or another with the organization represented by O'Keefe. There is, however, no verification of this allegation. The National head of this movement in Canada is reportedly Adrian Arcand. Arcand resides in Montreal and is editor of L'Illustration Nouvelle. O'Keefe is the founder and organizer of the movement in New Brunswick and is said to speak frequently at meetings in Toronto, Montreal, Canada and at other points. O'Keefe is credited with having made the statement that if the movement which he represents is successful in Canada, Maris Gatiou will be elevated to a position somewhat equivalent to that held by Dr. Joseph Goebbels in Germany.

O'Keefe is reported to have disclosed that the aim of his organization is to do away with all government constructed in the manner in which civil government exists today, to do away with political parties, to organize all activities, professions, businesses, etc. into syndicates. His plan would follow the lines which have been established by Mussolini for the corporate government of Italy.

O'Keefe reportedly has ascertained that the industrial centers of Canada are now strongly organized. The greatest strength of the movement is said to lie in the industrial areas but that enormous headway is now being made in the provinces. It is alleged that the number of members of this movement in Toronto, Montreal and Quebec is greater proportionately than the number in New Brunswick. According to O'Keefe the term "NATIONALIST" is no longer applied to the movement which he represents. The word "PATRIOTIC" is now employed because it is understood that a certain amount of odium has attached to the word "NATIONALIST" and that in the past considerable criticism has been raised concerning the Fascists in Canada. The party represented by O'Keefe is reported to be the "PARTY FOR NATIONAL UNITY OF CANADA". This party expects to eliminate all other parties and to so unify the country that there will be no other political groups.

O'Keefe is reported to be of medium height, slender, dark, with two conspicuous gold teeth in the upper right front of his mouth. His mouth is said to drop noticeably at the corners. He appears to be approximately 25 years of age.

3. The word goes around that a new meeting of the officers of the Party will be called soon, so as to discuss of a new way of working. In the meantime, the most fantastic rumors circulate among the members. First, it was that the leaders were arrested, that all the members would be arrested... and that sort of thing. As a whole, the members are discouraged to see their work at a standstill and, in several cases, very nervous about their own fate.

4. Stories of spies in the ranks circulate which make that kind of work even more delicate, you will understand. It is a sure fact, however, that orders were given by the leaders of the Party to keep quiet, not to hold public meetings, not to wear the fascist shirts, etc.,... On the other hand, collecting the membership fees continues. Local and individual meetings (sectional) are held in the main centres of Rosemont, Maisonneuve and St-Henri. But nobody seems to know what to do, what to expect or what to say.

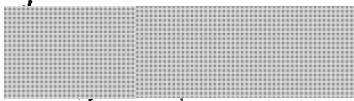

**Arcand Rallies Banned
For Duration of War**

On orders of Director Dufresne, Adrien Arcand was notified over the week-end by Captain J. Ennis, of the Montreal Police, to discontinue all meetings. Mr. Arcand replied that he was pleased, as head of the Fascist National Unity Party, to have been notified and that for the duration of the war he would see that no meetings be held. He had applied for a permit to hold a meeting last night, but this was not given and no meeting was held.

One hour after notice had been served on Arcand by Captain Ennis the head of the National Unity Party communicated with Captain Ennis and informed him that all officers of the organization had been notified, and that no meetings would be held for the duration of the war.

Arcand stated that it was the intention of his party to obey established authority.

Swastika Over Quebec: Party Record

BY JOHN HOARE

This article is a continuation of Mr. Hoare's study of the movement headed by Adrien Arcand, a description of whose recent meeting in Montreal appeared in a recent issue. Since the outbreak of war Mr. Arcand has given assurances to the police that he will hold no more meetings while hostilities are in progress. It is believed that the activities of the "leader" and his associates are being carefully watched.

THE Nazi movement in Canada began as soon as Adolf Hitler became Chancellor of Germany and a propoganda department was established by his government.

Ludecke, in his book of confessions, "I Knew Hitler," states that he himself helped to organize the Nazi movement here. "We were in happy mood," he writes, "when we drove to Montreal to keep our appointment with Adrien Arcand. . . He was greatly pleased when I gave him an autographed photograph of Hitler. We understood each other perfectly and agreed to co-operate in every way."

On September 28, 1933, Arcand sent a letter to Major Frank Peace, Bad Aachen, Germany, "If it can help you," he wrote, "you can act as correspondent of *Le Patriote*, which is known to Hitler and which is very well appreciated by the Nazi propoganda bureau. Don't forget to reach Ludecke, a most estimable friend, who was in the United States for several years. I have great faith in him."

This letter is quoted in the New York *Nation* of February 26, 1938, and the same issue carries a four page interview with Arcand which is most illuminating. The following extracts bear directly on the subject of the link with Germany:

"Interviewer: your movement is sympathetic with the Nazi regime in Germany?"

"Arcand: We are a national organization and we have no international affiliations, but we feel ourselves to be in moral solidarity with Hitler. . .

"Interviewer: What about this German printed material that is being circulated in Canada?"

"Arcand: We have received an odd bundle of leaflets from Hamburg. . .

"Interviewer: Do you stand for the destruction of democracy? In other words, if you were to take power in Canada would you permit opposition groupings to continue to exist? Or would you immediately illegalize them, as Hitler and Mussolini have done?"

"Arcand: We will immediately illegalize all other parties, declare unionism obligatory for bosses and workers, and organize the corporate state.

"Interviewer: If I understand you correctly, you are opposed to democratic liberalism because it tolerates communism?"

"Arcand: No, that is not entirely so. Even if there were no communism we would still be opposed to liberalism."

Finally, in Arcand's paper, *Le Combat National*,

appears an advertisement of a notorious German propoganda bureau, *Deutscher-Fichte-Bunde V.* of Hamburg. This advertisement offers a free service to your door giving all information concerning Germany today "et son travail anticommuniste." Note the old red herring appearing once more.

The above is sufficient to prove Arcand's link with the Hitler régime. Then why, with this German link established, was the Arcand party swastika symbol changed to a red Fascist torch? This switch is most illuminating.

In the spring of 1938 you will recollect that the Pope outspokenly condemned Hitler and his régime for their maltreatment of German Catholics. Now French-Canadians are Catholics. The Church in Quebec is Catholic. Clearly Arcand could not continue operating under the swastika. He did the obvious thing.

"On July 1, 1938," wrote Caiserman in a London periodical, "took place in Kingston, Ontario, a secret Nazi meeting. At this convention a new name was given to the Nazi party—namely the Canadian National Unity Party. The swastika as the emblem of the party was abolished and a new emblem adopted—a flaming torch."

FOR the Arcand party, up to the moment of the outbreak of the war, had succeeded in avoiding anything in the least degree resembling a breach with the Catholic authorities in the Province of Quebec. As I noted in my previous article, the Arcand meeting which I attended this summer took place in the church hall of St. Thomas Aquinas. Meetings had

frequently been held there. Leaflets giving notice of an Arcand meeting to be held at the Salle Dante on April 24, were distributed shortly before that date in the porches of at least five other churches in Montreal. In the church of Notre Dame de la Défense, also in Montreal, is a large and very splendid painting on the curved ceiling above the altar, incorporating more than a hundred figures. I have seen it myself. Saints and angels are there; martyrs clothed in leaves; cardinals in their brilliant robes; in the centre the Pope enthroned. Among the rich and varied colors a splash of black catches the eye from the right hand side of the picture—a group of figures in black, standing. These are no other than portraits of Italy's Fascist leaders. Balbo is clearly recognizable. Some of the others I could not identify. But one black figure overshadowed all the others, overshadows all that side of the picture, dominates everything except the Pope himself. It is Mussolini on a charger.

It is through Italy, rather than through Germany, that the Canadian Fascists now seek their linkage with their fellow workers for Fascism in Europe.

THE Arcand party also managed, up to the outbreak of war, to keep on good terms with the government of Premier Duplessis in Quebec. Arcand is by profession a journalist. His position is that of editor of *L'illustration Nouvelle*, a popular illustrated newspaper which gives general support to the Duplessis government. Arcand's party sheet, *Le*

Combat National, is printed on the same press as *L'illustration Nouvelle*. The columns of the latter have for a long time been open to the statements and proclamations of the National Social Christian Party. From the interview in the *Nation* which I have already quoted we learn that Arcand was asked whether it was true that he had held "an important position in the Conservative campaign apparatus during the last federal election," and replied: "I was in charge of their propoganda for the Province of Quebec. I specialized in anti-Communist work." While Mr. Duplessis' campaign was not officially described as "Conservative," it had the support of all the active Conservative elements in the Province of Quebec, and Mr. Duplessis himself was at one time the leader of what was officially designated as the provincial Conservative party.

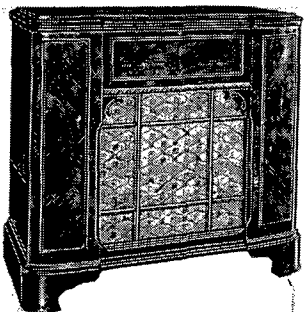
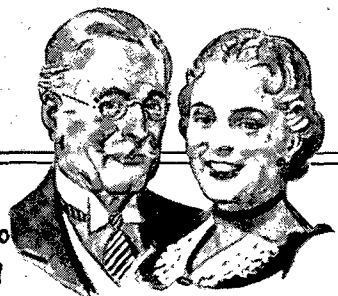
I SHOULD perhaps conclude these articles with a brief reference to myself and my connections with Canada. So far as I am aware, for the few hundred years that my family may be traced back, there is in it no element of Jewish blood; but of course, if one goes back far enough, one might happily find that one of Arcand's ancestors and one of mine sold old clothes together in the Orient! I lived in Montreal from 1910 to the Fall of 1921. During the war I went overseas with many old friends to help defend this country against the Boche who was then as now threatening liberty all over the world. In 1921 ill-health induced by war service compelled me to seek a milder climate. Now, after eighteen years, I return to Canada to find the Boche, long before the outbreak of open warfare, blatantly attacking on the home front—camouflaged, as usual, and enjoying a free hand for his operations until the very outbreak of the war.

Since that outbreak things have been greatly changed. In Montreal the R.C.M.P., with their traditional efficiency, have seized and incarcerated a considerable band of Nazis. Arcand's meetings have been forbidden. *Le Combat National* is, as I write, about to be forbidden. And Arcand himself, while he is apparently to be left at liberty, will presumably not pass unobserved.

Best Morale Will Win War

BY J. A. STEVENSON.

WHATEVER be the outcome of the struggle in Poland it is plain the decisive military struggle of the war will be fought out on the frontier between France and Germany, on both sides of which large bodies of troops have already been massed. The French and their British allies evidently intend that such devastation as occurs from the fighting is not to ruin a large area of the French countryside as it did in the last war, but that German soil is to get a taste of it; for they have taken the offensive and have already advanced a certain distance into German territory. The great difference between this war and the last is that both sides start with a formidable line of fortifications built at enormous expense as their base of operations, and before the coming winter is over there will probably be a bloody test of the respective strength and efficacy of these barriers.

The French are pinning their faith on the fortified barrier known as the Maginot line which consists of a chain of forts and blockhouses stretching from Lille southward along the Belgian frontier, then through north-eastern Lorraine and continuing along the west bank of the Rhine to the Swiss frontier. It is not intended as an impregnable obstacle to invasion but rather as a rampart, whose defenders can gain time for the mobilization of the nation to be completed. The French general staff became convinced of the value of good concrete fortifications when they found on reoccupying the chief forts at Verdun in 1917 that all the gun turrets and most of the concrete shelters were intact after having withstood a prolonged bombardment by heavy artillery. So they applied the lessons learnt there in the construction of the Maginot line, and took into consideration the increase in the penetrating power of modern shells in deciding upon the thickness of the layers of concrete and the armoured plate.

Tests of heavy artillery fire were made upon all the materials used, and the protection in the forts was made thick enough to withstand the impact of three shells striking at the same point. Safeguards against gas attack were also provided by a special air-conditioning process whereby the atmospheric pressure inside the forts is always kept slightly higher than outside.

WAR HASTENS THE HARVEST. Equally important to military measures of protection is the ensuring of adequate supplies of all kinds in England. Here is a recent busy scene on the estate of Lord Tredegar at Newport.

Maginot line, but is built on a quite different plan. There are some heavily fortified structures at intervals, but fundamentally it is a military position of great depth and considerable elasticity. Its average depth is said to be fifteen miles and in some sectors it attains a depth of thirty miles. On the front nearest France there is a ring of delaying outposts which the French are apparently engaged in capturing, and behind them is a series of stronger interlaced defensive links; for miles the whole terrain is studded with little forts, machine gun nests, and what were known in the last war as strong points — often fortified farmhouses. Throughout the whole fortified area there is a first-rate road system, along which artillery, tanks, and mechanised units can be moved with great rapidity.

Apparently the German tactics will not be to tie up any large number of troops in any particular stronghold, but to be ready for swift and decisive counter-attacks upon any ground taken before the captors have time to consolidate their position in it. So observers have noted that while the front areas of the Westwall are comparatively thinly held, large bodies of troops are kept ten or twelve miles behind it and the transportation system will enable these to be moved up very swiftly to any threatened point. The calculation is that this plan of tactics will prevent any vital ground being permanently yielded to the enemy and will minimize losses.

Stories have been disseminated to the effect that the hasty construc-

tion compared with the old imperial army despite its tremendous strength. The boundless devotion of the imperial army to its supreme Commander, the Kaiser, and the profound belief in the cause one was fighting for and in the moral integrity of the leadership do not exist. Our conscripted army is numerically tremendous. Its equipment is as modern as possible. But only war can decide whether reserves of ammunition, food, and so on are sufficient. . . .

Later he proceeds: "I differ in my views from most officers of lower rank because they are quite optimistic about the chances of Germany to win the next war. I myself, however, like most of my friends (active and retired officers), am rather gloomy. You will know that the recent reshuffle in the Supreme Army staff has something to do with the scepticism of many officers of higher rank.

"The struggle which once existed between the army and the S.A. has long been decided in favor of the army. But the Party (Nazi) watches closely the appointments of new officers from the point of view of party interests. I am a soldier of the old school and cannot understand young Nazi officers who are absolutely cynical and really believe that everything is justifiable provided one is powerful enough. These young officers are inclined to exaggerate the victories we celebrated after the march into Austria and the occupation of Prague. They dream of being so strong that no power in the world can resist them. . . . Those among us



You will note in para. 3 reference is made to John LORIMER, head of the Fischer Bearing Company in this city, which is described as a branch of a German concern. [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] acquainted with John LORIMER stated that LORIMER denies that the Fischer Bearing Co. in Toronto has a connection with a German firm.

3. Regarding paras. 4, 5 and 6, the information contained therein has been confirmed to some extent in previous reports. [REDACTED] LORIMER has refused to continue paying FARR'S wages and the rent of the N.U.P. headquarters and on account of that refusal the headquarters was moved from 40 Pearl St. to 71 Bloor St. E. It is believed that LORIMER'S business has suffered through his connection with the N.U.P. and he has made the statement that he cannot continue making personal contributions as his financial resources have been exhausted.

The Reaction of the Fascist Organizations in
Canada to the International Situation.

The National Unity Party.

1. Adrien ARCAND has more than ever proven himself a loyal servant of AXIS powers and a traitor to Canada - ARCAND has written a number of editorials in the "L'illustration Nouvelle" calling for complete isolation from events in Europe and for giving Hitler a free hand - In an editorial, March 21/39, in "L'illustration Nouvelle", ARCAND says: "Who is really menaced by the Nazi eastern expansion? England? No. France? Neither. But the U.S.S.R. which sees German army arriving at the border of the Ukraine." On the basis of such a misleading analysis, ARCAND draws the conclusion for his readers: "Messrs. King and Lapointe should understand that the Canadians are not at the service of Moscow". ARCAND calls on the Canadian people to be blind to events in Europe so that Hitler and Mussolini are given a free hand in their oppression against world democracy.
2. This open treacherous policy of ARCAND has resulted in dissatisfaction creeping into the ranks of the N.U.P., especially amongst the English-Canadian members - Joseph FARR, the National Organizer of the N.U.P. and Tom BIRKETT, Supervisor of sections in Ontario, are amongst those who disagree with ARCAND'S pro-Hitler policy.
3. ARCAND is now planning to get rid of FARR and BIRKETT. The decision for their removal was made at a secret meeting held on March 20, 1939 at the Old Mill, Toronto. Dr. Noel DECARIE and John LORIMER discussed the matter with ARCAND. Dr. DECARIE has a large dental establishment in Montreal, Philips Square, and appears to be one of the outstanding leaders of the N.U.P. John LORIMER is the actual leader of the N.U.P. in Ontario although very little is heard of him. LORIMER is the head of the Fischer Bearing Co., Terminal Warehouse, Toronto, a branch of a German concern. LORIMER came into light about a year ago as the man behind the Fascist movement in Ontario - As a result of this he withdrew from all open activity and continued to work secretly as the leader of the N.U.P. in Ontario.
4. LORIMER pays the rent for the N.U.P. headquarters, 40 Pearl St., Toronto, FARR'S wages, etc. The income from dues in the month of March was \$12. LORIMER pays the rest. It is a known fact that his business suffered heavily as a result of the boycott. Where does he get the money to finance the N.U.P. in Ontario? He is planning to get the N.U.P. to hold a number of meetings in Ontario as well as open a hall for activity amongst women in the Bloor and Yonge district, Toronto.
5. LORIMER was not satisfied with the type of speeches delivered by the N.U.P. orators and asked them to submit speeches to him for approval before being delivered. He objected to their attacks on the Leadership League, saying that it was a movement in the right direction which they should support. He was especially irked by the pro-British pronouncements of FARR and BIRKETT - It was thru that he urged ARCAND to remove

FARR, and if that wasn't possible due to the lack of leaders, FARR was to act only under his (LORIMER'S) orders. Mrs. LORIMER is to head the Womens' Section of the N.U.P. in Toronto. There has as yet been no showdown with FARR but it is obvious that it is coming soon.

6. On Wednesday, March 22nd, FARR was called to attend a meeting in Montreal. There he was told that he is to go for a national tour with ARCAND in order to take advantage of the favorable situation in the West (no doubt referring to the large German speaking population) that another man will work closely with LORIMER. FARR realizes that this proposal is for the purpose of getting him out of Ontario and is not enthusiastic. ARCAND'S tour of Western Canada fits in with plans of the Nazis for a campaign to link the German and French speaking people into an isolation block, that would force the Federal Government to pursue a "Hands off Hitler" policy.

7. German Nazi agents have as a result of Hitler's conquests become more bold than ever. They are calling for a united front with the French-Canadian people (Read Arcand, Paul Bouchard and other fascist traitors) in order to force the Canadian government to give a free hand to the Axis powers. Writing in the Deutsche Zeitung for Canada, a Nazi paper printed in Winnipeg, the editor B. BOTT says "when our French-Canadian citizens are bringing pressure for a policy of neutrality, it is also necessary that the Canadian citizens of German origin should place a similar demand to the government and parliament"...In the past, the Germans in Canada were too modest and left questions of Canadian policy for other people to decide. We must get out of our backwardness and more than ever see to it that we exert our influence on Canada's policies. It is not enough to be followers of certain political parties in Canada. Germandon in Canada does not have to play a subordinate role". (Deutsche Zeitung for Canada, Feb. 15, 1939).

8. The editorial from which the above quotation was taken was preceded by the following statement of Adolf Hitler: "A state which in the epoch of race-poisoning, dedicates itself to the cherishing of its best racial elements, must some day be master of the world."

9. With this idea in mind, Nazi agents are beginning to hint about the right to public schools in the German language for children of German origin. This is especially true in Western Canada. At their annual convention, held in Saskatoon on July 2, 1938, the Saskatchewan Deutsche Arbeitsgemeinschaft, (German-Canadian United League) called for the restoration of the right of minority groups to teach the children in their public schools the mother tongue of the majority of the ratepayers in a school district, where the majority of the ratepayers are of foreign extraction. The resolution was read again at a banquet held on the evening of July 2nd, in the presence of the Hon. J.W. Estey, the Saskatchewan Minister of Education who greeted the Gemeinschaft convention on behalf of the Saskatchewan Government.

10. At this same convention another resolution was passed which called for the suppression of freedom of criticism of the Nazi regime. The resolution reads in part as follows: "Whereas according to the

last census 162,000 of the population of the Province of Saskatchewan is of German descent or origin, and it has become evident that certain persons occupying public positions have made utterances most annoying to the said people, and whereas appears from time to time in a section of our daily press in the Province and publications outside of our Province, certain anti-German propaganda without having regards for facts ... Be it resolved that we, the German-Canadian citizens of Canada, resident in the Province of Saskatchewan assembled at this reunion, petition the Government of the Dominion of Canada to enact such measure as may be necessary to prevent the recurrence of such incidents and further to induce the press from publishing harmful anti-German propaganda which tends to disrupt the unity of our citizens and hatred amongst different racial groups in our Province."

11. The brazenness of the disseminators of the worst type of race-hating materials, calling for suppression of free criticism in Canada is symptomatic of the boldness of the Nazi agents.

12. Similar brazenness expresses the speech of Chancellor Otto Janssen, delivered to a rally of German pupils under the auspices of the German-Canadian Bund. This rally took place on Friday, March 31, 1939, in the Prosvita (Ukrainian) Hall, Winnipeg. Prizes were handed out to contestants in a German spelling and composition competition. 204 children participated in this Bund-sponsored contest. According to the Deutsche Zeitung fur Canada, April 5, 1939 Herr Otto Janssen said: "Dear parents, dear children! I'm exceptionally happy to be present at this Festival of German pupils. The big attendance here is the best proof that the maintenance and extension of the German language and German culture is dear to your hearts. In German countries one does not have to worry about bringing up the children in the German spirit and in the German language. This is understood by all. This is part of the upbringing of every German giving him a place among Germandom. But how different things are abroad; with what difficulties and obstacles one must grapple especially in such countries where German nationals are through narrow-minded laws denied the privilege of bringing up their children in German people's schools. You undoubtedly know that the school laws of Manitoba of 1897 provided for bilingualism in the public schools when there were more than ten pupils speaking another language than English. In 1916 this law was rescinded so that Germans are since then forced to take upon themselves the responsibility for teaching the German language. In spite of all difficulties, German-Canadian organizations are quite successful in this regard.

13. The possibilities which were created for spreading and maintaining the German language were utilized more and more from year to year. We can hope and expect that this interest will grow and deepen. Every child of German parents shall master the German language, and shall both speak and write German. But this alone is not enough. It follows naturally that we shall bring up the young generation to think and feel as Germans. It is the duty of the parents to bring up the children in the German spirit. With all their might they must strive to instill in the child German habits, manners and the German language. The children will be thankful for that. Through an understanding of the German language, the children will have access to the cultural wealth of Germandom. When they learn the German language in this manner from generation to generation, then it will not be difficult to preserve Germandom abroad. Just as in Germany our youth is in the ranks of the Nazi Youth Movement so shall the German youth abroad, be deeply anchored to Germandom.

14. Let us be clear that the idea of the melting pot of nations in Canada will never produce any good. A human being of German blood is and will remain German. Neither the place of birth nor anything else will change the German into anything else. This is the undisputed law of nature. Any good German is automatically a good Canadian. All German-Canadians are pictured by the unscrupulous anti-German press in this country in a different light. The press is doing everything it can to discredit all that is German."

15. This last part quoted is something that all Nazi agents use in their speeches in order to cover up their treasonable preachings. Once Herr Janssen uttered the Nazi "Loyalty" to Canada, he continued in the following tone: "But thank God the time is passed when everybody can trample Germany under feet (stormy applause-hear, hear). In certain countries they cannot get used to the idea that in Germany they were used to keep in chains of the Versailles Treaty is no more, that Germany is now free from the yoke of foreign domination and that it is to-day the power in Europe. That is why our hearts beat faster and faster when we see or hear our fearless and wise fuehrer, Adolf Hitler, be it on the screen or at the microphone. We greet our beloved homeland, our greater Germany and call across the sea: The German people and our great fuehrer Adolf Hitler Sieg Heil (Hail Victory.)"

16. The type of speech delivered by Chancellor Otto Janssen to Canadian-born children, is being repeated by Nazi agents all over the country. Their seditious utterings grow bolder with every one of Hitler's conquests. To-day they only hint of public schools in the German language; to-morrow, they hope to create a Sudeten problem in Canada.

The Italian Fascio.

17. The Italian part of the Axis is very active in Canada to mobilize the support of the Italians in Canada for Il Duce's war plans. In Quebec, under the guise of Italian culture, prominent French-Canadians are being drawn into the fascist orbit. The Italian fascists are taking advantage of the campaign for corporatism that is being carried on by certain sections of the clergy to extend the fascist influence among French-Canadians. The type of Italian fascist agitation carried on amongst the Canadians of Italian origin is best illustrated by the following speeches delivered to the Piave lodge of the Sons of Italy, an organization which operates under a Federal charter. The occasion was the presentation of a new banner to the Piave Lodge on its 20th anniversary. The celebration took place in the Casa D'Italia, Montreal on March 19, 1939 and is printed in L'Italia Nuova, March 25, 1939, a fascist paper printed in Montreal, edited by Giulio Romano. Montreal

18. The Italian Consul in Montreal, Paulo de Simone said: "Nothing could give me more pleasure as Consul, ex-serviceman and fascist than to be present tonight at the consecration of the new banner which is about to be given to the Piave Lodge, and to be at this celebration of the 20th anniversary of your patriotic lodge"

19. You of the older generation will understand me better than the youth. When you left your fatherland it had not yet attained its greatness of today. You were looked down on. Today, when Italy is strong and feared they are boycotting us -- those meserables...

20. The Italy that has conquered an empire will present a strong front to its enemies. Nobody can stop her march to new and greater destinies.

21. Turbulent times are ahead, and it is not without significance that I appeal and invite the co-operation, the solidarity and unbreakable unity of your strength and spirit. United against all attacks and against all boycotters you will be in a position to resist and conquer.

22. Italians! Lift your hearts up! And in the presence of the new flag which we are placing alongside the others, let us lift up our thoughts, and at the summit of those thoughts let there always be Italy, the King and Emperor and Il Duce.

23. Display your colours to the breeze, oh flag of Italy, display your colours and fear not the adverse winds. Behind you are the sons of Italy. We are behind you and will watch over you, proud of your glory ... And if necessary we will defend you until death ... because in dying for you we are sure that we are dying for the motherland."

24. After listening to such speeches it was only natural that Mr. S. W. Narizzano, the godfather at the consecration of the new banner to reaffirm as he did, his ex-serviceman's spirit, saying that he will always be prepared to answer "present" to the call of the fatherland.

1. The National Unity Party held a public meeting at Quebec City on May 21st, at 2:15 P.M. The attendance totalled some 3500 people in all, which was a great disappointment considering the boastful predictions of ARCAHD himself who had stated that 10,000 people would be present, and that Quebec was fascist minded.

2. At the meeting I noticed some 375 members and officers in the uniform of the Party from Montreal. By close observance, and reliable information, I can add that others in civilian clothes from Montreal numbered some 300 more. Of these last a good number were merely relatives or friends of members who had come mostly for the trip or because of other reasons.

3. For the transportation, a good number of trucks were used, but most were regular private cars. Two buses were chartered by the Feminine Section. Because of insufficient transportation for the Legionnaires and Iron Guard, who numbered some 125, two trucks had to be rented from the "Eddy Drive Yourself". The bulk of cars were used privately by families who knowing of the meeting left for Quebec independent of Party schedule or rules, so that one may understand that the Party itself did not have any big expense to undergo, so far as transportation was concerned.

4. Three trucks left 7150 Chateaubriand locality at midnight, Saturday, May 20th. These carried 41 Legionnaires and Iron Guards, including officers in charge of those in each truck. Lic. numbers were F 6883, F 20260, and F 5104. Truck F 5104 was stopped by a Motorcycle Policeman on the corner of Pie LX and Beaubien for passing a stop sign. The policeman called the driver out and told him he would let him get away with it for a consideration. The driver took some change out of his pocket, but the officer said "No Change". When the driver replied he had no other money, he accepted 50 cents. All this is brought to your attention namely for the reason that it was the cause of many sarcastic remarks about the "Democratic Police".

5. At 5 A.M. of May 21st, other cars left the 7150 Chateaubriand locality, including the two Drive Yourself trucks. Two of the cars bore the license No. 25-876 and 62-506. The first truck to arrive in Quebec was F 5104. Others followed and arrived shortly after. The Quebec Organizer who is a young man of about 25 years of age, met these at the Cemetery and conducted them to a restaurant. This Quebec City fellow had a car bearing the Lic. 11-711, an old Ford car.

6. Many Montrealers showed discouragement at about 2 P.M., when it was noticed that not many people were in the hall. At 2:15 the meeting started and it was not until some time later that the assembly reached its reported audience. All males in uniform were assigned to do guard duty around the Arena. The attendance compared to the holding capacity of the hall was so low that it appeared very bare. The far end and most of the upper seats were unoccupied. The pit around the platform in the center of the arena contained 500 people.

7. RENE CHABOT presided. The speakers were DANIEL O'KEEFE of New Brunswick and ADRIEN ARCAND. O'Keefe made a somewhat mild speech stating the necessity of a new system of government as well as the need of Canadians to get back their possessions which are the present holdings of strangers meaning Jews. O'Keefe is well-liked by the Frenchmen who know him, and is mentioned with admiration by other Party Officers.

8. ADRIEN ARCAND spoke last. It was thought by most that he would have something entirely new for the Quebecers, but his speech hardly left the lines of his usual utterances. I feel that it is unnecessary to repeat what we have heard him utter so many times. I shall mention only principal statements. First he mentioned that his enemies were doing the utmost to discredit the Party with stupid propaganda. He referred to the papers passed round Quebec, and which is being enclosed.

9. He accused the government of letting Jewish immigrants come into the country and believing their false promises of becoming colonists or farmers. The control of all industries and resources in the hands of Jewish finance.

10. Accused Lapointe of being a partisan of Jews and their interests, and mentioned cases where the Minister of Justice showed Jewish preference by giving life sentences to Jewish murderers while hanging Christians. Mentioned the Tony Frank case as example. Called Hon. B. Lapointe a traitor for helping in the repeal of article 98. Liberating TIM BUCK, thus ensuring the ravages of communism in Canada. Mentioned the usual 18,000 Communists presently in Toronto, with some 40,000 sympathizers. Canada was in more danger than any other country had ever been of Communist Revolution.

11. Stated that Canadians should not be made to fight in foreign wars, without the people's consent, by referendum. If Canadians over 18 were thought fit to be soldiers, they were also fit to decide on whether they should fight or not. (This brought the highest applause of the day). By his loud and somewhat fiery statements ARCAND was trying hard to impress the Quebecers.

12. He mentioned the usual names of Jewish capitalists Associated Communism with Jewry. Mentioned and compared its growth to an apple. First the flower, then the apple, then the fall when it rots. Socialism, followed by Communism, followed by Anarchism.

13. The speech of ARCAND lasted for a considerable ⁴⁵⁰ time. At about 5:30 P.M. Arcand emerged from the Arena between two rows of uniformed members. These totalled about 125. He embarked into Dr. NOEL DECARIE's car with Dr. Decarie, D. O'KEEFE, and two other minor officers of the Party. LEO BRUNET

drove the car away. This same car stopped later at the St. Ible Hotel on St. Valier. The proprietor is both a member and a friend of ARCAID's. About 60 members of both sexes also had meals there. Two officers had rented a room on the previous night. These two being MAJ. J.H. SCOTT and LOUIS POULIOT.

14. Needless to mention the majority of the principal officers of the Quebec province of the Party were present in Quebec City.

15. The main reason for having men get to Quebec City for the early morning of Sunday was to distribute cards announcing the assembly, at church doors. The Quebec City fellow had a list of churches which were of 22 parishes. The trucks followed the Ford and at each church one, two and even three Montrealers were left with packages of cards for distribution, as the people came out of the various churches, and from the different masses. The total number of cards for distribution were 20,000.

16. The Quebec City man had all the figures down regarding the approximate number of people attending churches in the various parishes. He alone directed the number of people to be left there, with the amount of cards. At some churches 500 would be left with one man, at others 1,000 would be left with two men. The amount did not exceed 1,500 cards or three men.

17. The police had given permission for this. The clergy too had given permission at various churches, but a good many priests had given to understand that they did not wish distribution of tickets to be done directly outside the church doors, but only at the street corners nearest the church. In order to prevent any friction, all the Montreal card distributors were left at street corners nearest the church, and none at church doors. No Quebec city members were used for this work of distribution, which leads us to conclude that few or none were available for it.

18. In conversation with Quebec people, I have come to understand that the Party is not as well known as ARCAID wants us to believe. Many Quebec people actually asked if the Party had any members or branch in Quebec City. One Quebec policeman stated that though the Party was not well known, the people there are very curious and a fair enough turn-out might be expected.

19. Most of the Montrealers were picked up by 11:30 a.m. from their various stations. In inquiring none stated of trouble, and many said that information concerning the movement had been asked by the church goers.

20. On my 18th papers criticizing the movement of Adrien ARCAID had been distributed by people who called themselves "Section de Quebec Parti Communiste du Canada". There were about 7 of these available and I am sending one in for your inspection.

21. The trucks went to the Arena where the meeting was to take place. GATIER and about 6 other people were working about the place in fixing chairs, etc. I was told that the menbers with GATIER were the Quebec members of the Party.

Only one or two had the Party uniform. I know for a fact that Mrs. ARCAID had only this number to help in the decoration of the same hall two days previous. One of these Quebec fellows made the remark that there were some 40 Sections of the Party there. A section might number some 5 people. (From what I heard and saw, Quebec City and its Party members are very small in number.

22. I am concluding this because of the first reason that 41 Montrealers had to handle the total work of Assembly Announcements; the handful of Quebec members present for making the preparations for the first and most important meeting ever held there; and remarks made by important officers of Montreal who have stated that Quebec City was not far ahead in regard to the movement. Another close observation showed that the applause during the meeting came strongly from the Montrealers, but not so strong from the others, and of these last, many rarely applauded.

23. MARIUS GATIER was the first one seen in Quebec, when the trucks arrived at the Arena. He and the few others mostly youngsters were fixing up things. Later a few others came in and stated that though they had come in the previous night, they had been visiting the city. This last group were in a coupe bearing the Lic. No. 43-187. The owner and driver of the car is a pure German and seems to be fairly well-off. It is known that he is both a member of our Party and a member of the German Club. This German fellow has often advised French members to go to the German Club to solicit funds for the National Unity Party and he felt certain that these Frenchmen would be well received.

24. Mrs. A. ARCAID came later. She had been staying with relatives in Quebec during the last few days. She had much admiration for the half dozen Quebecers who decorated the hall under her direction, though it had been so much work. Stated also that two Jews had come to inspect the hall while they were doing the decorating on May 18. These had left in their car after hanging around for considerable time. She believed these two were Montreal Jews.

25. Dr. NOEL BEGARIE and wife were seen about 1:00 P.M. of the same day. These were in their Packard touring black car Lic.no. 50-284. By 2 p.m. most of the Montrealers had arrived. The approximate number of trucks and cars parked outside the Arena was about 75.

26. The buses used by the Section Feminine bore Lic.no. A769 and A 770.



1. A rally of the feminine Sections of the N.U.P. for the province was held at 1896 Orleans St. The attendance was some 200 people, mostly women, together with a number of male members of the Party.

2. Most of it was routine work, thanking those who were working so hard and asking the officers to stick to their duties, etc. ADRIEN ARCAND also spoke. 
